Contributors may submit articles in English, and each article should be accompanied by a brief abstract (150 words) in English and the complete address of the author, including e-mail.

Authors should send their manuscript as email attachment to newsimmelstudies@gmail.com in format .rtf (readable with Word for Windows/Mac). Texts should be written with twelve sized Garamond and conform to the Simmel Studies' style. Articles will be double blind peer reviewed by members of the editorial board. Authors will receive confirmation of the appropriate reception of their articles and subsequently an evaluation form.
